CRAIG KRENZEL

Craig Krenzel will long be remembered for his role as the starting quarterback on Ohio State's 2002 national championship team. Time-andagain during the championship season, Krenzel rallied his teammates from the brink of defeat and led them to victory. When the season was over, the Buckeyes were 14-0 and had claimed the ultimate prize - the National Championship. But Krenzel was perhaps even more accomplished in the classroom than he was on the football field. A molecular genetics major, he was named winner of the Socrates Award as a junior. The latter is presented by Sporting News Radio to the outstanding student-athlete in the nation. As a senior, Krenzel was named to a first-team berth on the Academic All-America Team and singled out as the Academic All-America of the Year by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Additionally, he was selected as one of 13 football seniors nationwide to receive a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholarship. At the NFFHF awards dinner in New York in December, he was again singled out, this time receiving the Vincent DePaul Draddy Award, which is awarded annually to one of the scholarship winners. Finally, he capped off a brilliant year by being named as one of the recipients of the NCAA's prestigious Top VIII Award for combined excellence in athletics, academics and community involvement.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATION AND HALL OF FAME SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

Each year, the National Football Foundation awards a scholarship to the Top 13 seniors in college football. The \$18,000 grant for graduate work is based upon combined excellence in athletics and academics. Over the years, Ohio State has produced 19 recipients. At its annual awards banquet, the Foundation also presents the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award to the top senior in the group. Buckeyes Bobby Hoying (1995) and Craig Krenzel (2003) are the only Big Ten players to win that award.

MIKE LANESE

Mike Lanese always will occupy a special place in the hearts and minds of Ohio State fans everywhere. His clutch grab against Michigan in 1984 has become known as "The Catch" and is one of the most memorable receptions in Ohio State history. But Lanese's legacy also includes some memorable accomplishments in the classroom, where after twice being named to the Academic All-America team, he was named as Rhodes Scholar in 1985. The former OSU flanker is the last Big Ten football player to be so honored. After completing his studies at Oxford, Lanese served in the U.S. Navy.



BOBBY HOYING

Ohio State quarterback Bobby Hoying was one of the National Football Foundation's 13 scholarship recipients in 1995. Additionally, at the awards banquet in New York, Hoying was named winner of the Vincent dePaul Draddy Award, which goes annually to the top senior scholar-athlete in college football. Hoying was the first Big Ten player ever to receive the award, which is based on athletics, academics and community involvement.
